

PLAN YOUR SCHOOL VISIT

Visits to NOMA provide opportunities for students to engage with art from many cultures and time periods. Guided discussions about works of art encourage students to make observations, build connections, and think critically.

1. Select Guided or Self-Guided Visit.

Guided Visits | October 5, 2016 - May 26, 2017 | Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays | 9:30 and 10:30 am Spark creativity and critical thinking with a guided tour of NOMA. Knowledgeable docents engage small groups in age-appropriate discussions. Tours are interactive and conversational, and are aligned with state and national educational standards for visual arts, language arts, and social studies. Please note, for the best tour experience, a maximum of 80 students per time slot can be scheduled.

Self-Guided Visits | Year Round | Tuesday - Friday beginning at 10:00 am

Design and lead your own tour of NOMA. Visual art, language arts, history, science, and math can be explored in NOMA's extensive permanent collections, compelling temporary exhibitions, and outdoor sculpture garden. Use the free *Educator's Guide to the Collection* to find information on selected works of art and suggestions for gallery discussions and activities.

2. Select Your Tour Topic

Choose from our thoughtfully designed tours that approach selected works from a visual art, language arts, or social studies perspective, or visit a featured exhibition. With one month's notice, you may request a customized tour.

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TOUR TOPICS

Language Arts Approach

What's the Story?

Construct the elements of a story and imagine what could happen outside of the frame. Characters, setting, and plot are identified throughout the galleries as students formulate stories from works of art in NOMA's collection.

Describe it!

A picture may be worth a thousand words, but how can we describe what we see? Students develop observation skills and build descriptive language as they use synonyms and adjectives to describe works of art.

Social Studies Approach

Continents & Cultures

Travel the world and meet diverse cultures within NOMA's galleries. Students discuss how people around the world have used the materials available to them to express themselves and interpret their environments.

My Country, My State

Explore the history of the United States and Louisiana. The rich cultural heritage of our state is highlighted as students consider how artists represent place while investigating objects from different eras of our nation's history.

Visual Art **Approach**

Methods & Materials

Investigate how objects are made and discuss the decisions that artists make to best express their ideas. Students compare and contrast different media such as painting, sculpture, photography, printmaking, or ceramics.

Elements of Art

Introduce students to the ABCs of art -- line, color, shape, form, texture, and space. Students examine how artists utilize the elements to create a boundless visual language.

EXHIBITION TOURS

October 19, 2016 - January 13, 2017

Seeing Nature

Landscapes locate the viewer in time and space. See works by European and American masters Canaletto, Turner, Cole, Monet, Klimt, and O'Keeffe in this exhibition from the private collection of the Paul G. Allen family.

February 22 - May 19, 2017

Venice: A Life of Seduction

Visit Venice, Italy during the 1700s in this lush presentation of life in the city built on canals. Paintings by Canaletto and Guardi, glass, textiles, and other decorative arts introduce the art, style, and pastimes of Venetians.

EXHIBITIONS

September 9, 2016 - January 1, 2017

Something in the Way: **Photography and** Obstruction

This exhibition from NOMA's permanent collection explores accidental and intentional obstructions in photographic images. Selected photographs draw attention to photography's dual dependence on the real world and on the photographer, who determines how much of that world we get to see.

October 14, 2016 - January 15, 2017

Seeing Nature: Landscape Masterworks from the Paul G. Allen Family Collection

Seeing Nature explores the development of landscape painting from a window on the world to expressionistic

interpretations of the natural world. Paintings by European and American artists from five centuries record dramatic phenomena and natural spaces.

November 4, 2016 - February 19, 2017

George Dunbar: Elements of Chance

New Orleans native George Dunbar played a pivotal role in introducing abstract art to the South. His paintings, sculptures, assemblages, and prints marry the stark geometry of modern art with lush, organic materials that evoke Louisiana's bayous. This career survey explores the evolution of Dunbar's art from the 1950s to recent work in clay relief.

Through May 2017

Françoise Billion Richardson Collection of African Art

This recent bequest of New Orleans collector, Françoise Billion Richardson, includes examples from the Dan, Akan, Yoruba and Ashanti peoples.

February 17 - May 21, 2017

A Life of Seduction: Venice in the 1700s

Venice played a leading role in the development of Western art, architecture, and culture. A Life of Seduction includes paintings, costumes, and decorative arts that explore the cultural wealth of Venice in the 1700s, when artists such as Canaletto and Tiepolo spread Venetian style throughout the world.
